IS IT STILL SUMMER?

We never want summer to end and this October has turned out to be one to remember (so far!). We also all know that being as busy as we are in our daily lives in the Consulting and Roofing industry that we can all work up a hearty appetite and need something to satisfy that! RCIWCC board member Ted Neef (RRO) from BC Roof Inspections spends some of his down time out in the back yard around the smoker and was kind enough to put together this great Smoked Pulled Pork Recipe for us to enjoy while we still can!

Smoked Pulled Pork

Pig. The magical, tasty animal. Quite often best served from a smoker. I thought that I'd share my method for a bullet proof pulled pork. I run a Weber Smokey Mountain set up with unlit natural charcoal. I use a full Weber chimney starter and add these coals to the unlit coals when ready. Typically, I'll start the fire at 5am, planning for the meat to be on at 5:30. While the fire is starting, make up the rub and apply heavily to 3-3.5lb pieces of boneless pork shoulder. The rub consists of equal parts paprika, granulated garlic, brown sugar, black pepper, salt, ground coriander, onion powder, Keen's dry mustard.



Add 4 fist sized chunks of oak and 2 of cherry wood to your smoker, tucking them in amongst the coals. Fill your water pan and place the meat on the rack.



Check your temperature; should be between 225-250°. Adjust airflow as required. Once your temp is set, leave it alone. Resist the temptation to peek and check on the meat. Check the amount of fuel remaining at 1:30pm. If necessary, add another ½ chimney of lit coals.



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I will smoke mine to an internal temperature of 205°. This ensures a nice pull. Typically, you want to start checking at 3:15pm. Depending on the weather and size of the meat, it may be ready to come off. Remove and wrap with tinfoil and hold in an empty cooler for 30 minutes or until ready to serve.
